

DEPUTY COORDINATOR PROGRAM – Pulaski County's problem:

High stress 24x7 + no back-up = turnover

- High risk of emergencies due to I-81, industrial base and a topography that amplifies flooding potential
- Normal back-up by other staff was not working due to lack of confidence
 - Director of Operations
 - County Administrator His involvement would likely result in a secondary emergency
- Emergency manager burn-out resulting in
- Existing staff getting hired by VDEM lost two in back-toback turnovers
- Had no local succession options

PULASKI COUNTY EMERGENCIES – In the five years since the program was put in place:

Several managed by Deputy Coordinators due to Coordinator being involved with State training or mutual assistance to other localities.

- Winter storms and water shortage in 2010
- Hazardous materials spills in 2010
- Flooding in 2010
- Tornadoes in 2011
- Wildfires in 2012
- Derecho in 2012
- Winter storms and flooding in 2013
















































































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DEPUTY COORDINATOR PROGRAM – What Pulaski County did:

- Hired three part-time Deputy Coordnators
- Organized and paid for NIMS and Haz-Mat training
- Set-up coverage schedule
- Set up sharing of vehicle, contacts, facility and equipment access and background information
- Paid deputy coordinators for \$25 per day for on-call service
- Pay \$12 per hour for Deputy Coordinator response

DEPUTY COORDINATOR PROGRAM – What Pulaski County got:

- Certain in-county coverage 24x365
- Ability to maintain 24 hour coverage in the event of extended emergency situations
- Built-in succession planning
- Ability to have multiple perspectives in planning and other non-response functions
- Allows Emergency Management Coordinator to focus on long-term planning and specific Board of Supervisors goals related to emergency management issues

SIDE BENEFIT – Real Progress

- 18 Emergency Shelters set up
- Towable generators purchased and ready for deployment
- Emergency communications infrastructure greatly improved with complete back-up transmitter
- Emergency Operations Center established and equipped
- Citizen notification system put in place
- Rescue and demolition equipment purchased
- Joint dispatch being established
- New Sheriff's Office put in place
- Designation as a Storm Ready Community
