# VACo passes savings to county members by reducing dues

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The Virginia Association of Counties will lower its county membership dues by 1 cent for the upcoming 2014-15 fiscal year. The current rate of 22 cents has been in place for the past six years.

"The association's efficient operations and successful fiscal strategy allow us to pass savings to member counties," VACo Executive Director Jim Campbell said. "We try to be a leader and an example, not only to our counties but also to other associations. Our commitment to strong business principles and exemplary customer service has proven to be successful. We are excited to share our success with our member counties."

VACo has elevated its presence during the past several years. The association's advocacy efforts have saved counties millions and have given them freedom from cumbersome mandates. VACo's leadership and educational programs have benefited scores of supervisors and county staffers who now serve their constituents better. And its professional technical assistance has improved the way counties conduct business.

VACo's membership services and entrepreneurial programs provide significant non-dues revenue to support the association. From programs like its Cooperative Purchasing to its Deferred Compensation to its Insurance, VACo offers counties with options that save them money and help keep member dues minimal.

VACo's recently launched the Virginia Investment Pool (VIP), which local governments and other political subdivisions use to invest assets they expect to hold for one year or longer. VIP invests assets of governmental participants in high-quality corporate and government securities and achieves a higher rate of return compared to traditional money market funds by investing in slightly longer-term securities as authorized under the Virginia Investment of Public Funds Act. VIP opened for business in February 2014 with \$65 million in initial investments. Today, the program boasts an excess of \$125 million in investments.

VACo encourages counties to continue to use its endorsed products and take advantage of the savings available.

# Fracking Workshop draws high interest



More than 60 local officials attended the VACo Fracking Workshop on May 1 in Hanover County. The workshop featured five speakers who covered many aspects of the topic.

"It was a productive and informative educational event that benefitted our members," said VACo General Counsel Phyllis Errico, who moderated the workshop. "I'd like to thank our speakers. Their presentations were thorough, and they also offered tools to address specific issues."

VACo will continue to closely monitor developments associated with fracking, which has emerged as a significant issue to local governments. The presence of gas and oil deposits in the Taylorsville Basin as well as the George Washington National Forest have caused concerns regarding fracking in several parts of the state.

During the workshop, Mike Skiffington, Program Manager with the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy, informed attendees of DMME's plans to develop regulations relating to the fracking process with the assistance of a "Regulatory Advisory Panel" (RAP) that will be comprised of diverse stakeholders, including local government representatives. Over the next few months VACo will update members on the process.

# Dominion receives major federal wind energy demonstration grant

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) announced on May 7 that Dominion Virginia Power was one of three companies selected from a nationwide competition to receive a \$47 million grant to support a wind turbine demonstration project off the coast of Virginia.

According to Dominion, offshore wind has the potential to provide the largest, scalable renewable resource for Virginia if it can be achieved at reasonable cost to customers. To help determine how this can be accomplished, Dominion is involved in the Virginia Offshore Wind Technology Advancement Project (VOWTAP), the research and development project supporting offshore wind generation that received the grant.

"This is great news for Virginia and a key step toward my goal of making Virginia the economic hub for research, development and construction of wind turbines off of our coast and at other offshore sites around the nation," said Governor McAuliffe. "The demonstration project alone will have an economic impact of approximately \$10 million a year and create up to 100 jobs through the end of construction. It will also highlight the tremendous opportunity Virginia has to generate clean energy, employment opportunities and economic growth by leading the globe in the renewable energy sector."

The demonstration facility is



approximately 27 miles (~24 nautical miles) off the coast of Virginia and the cable line connecting the offshore site to land is currently planned to be located at the Camp Pendleton State Military Reservation in Virginia Beach. To view a map of the site, click here.

VACo spoke with Dominion's Molly Plautz, Supervisor for Alternate Energy Solutions Initiatives and asked about opportunities for counties to position themselves and their businesses to benefit from this new economic activity.

"Dominion has conducted a preliminary economic impact study and will conduct a more detailed economic impact study for the region and state as the project moves forward, however county staff and officials are welcome to call or email our project team to ask questions and let us know if they have an interest in the project," said Plautz.

In its DOE application, the Dominion project team proposed designing, developing and demonstrating a grid-connected, 12-megawatt offshore wind facility consisting of two Alstom 6-megawatt turbines mounted on innovative, hurricane proof foundations. In Virginia, 1-megawatt of offshore wind can help power up to 250 homes at peak demand. Dominion's project schedule has the project becoming operational in 2017.

# VRS Updates Rate Resolution Methods Due July 1

The Virginia Retirement System (VRS) reported in its May 2014 Employer Update that local governing bodies and school boards must officially elect their VRS employer retirement contribution rates for the 2014-2016 biennium through a local resolution by July 1.

Employers may elect to pay either the rate certified by the VRS Board of Trustees or an alternate rate for contribution rates effective July 1, 2014.

VRS mailed all administrative heads a resolution packet providing specific contribution rate options in early May.

At VACo's request, VRS sent a follow up e-mail on May 15 to local administrative heads that provides additional administrative flexibility for localities to demonstrate to VRS the contribution rate selected by the governing body. Localities may adopt the resolution provided by VRS certifying the rate selected by July 1 and then send VRS the completed resolution by July 10. Alternately, if your governing body has previously approved a VRS contribution rate as part of its budget process, your locality may now send VRS confirmation of the rate selected by July 10 rather than go through the process of adopting a separate resolution.

The confirmation of the rate selection must be signed by the administrative head or clerk and include specific documentation detailing the rate selected. School divisions electing the certified rate must obtain approval from their local governing body. Local governing bodies should utilize VRS' detailed and individualized instructions sent to each administrative head.

In a separate but related matter, VRS recently reminded employers that are currently phasing in the 5 percent member contribution for Plan 1 and Plan



2 employees, must approve the 2015 fiscal year contribution election and submit an updated resolution to VRS by no later than July 10. Administrative heads and fiscal officers received a letter and an updated resolution from VRS in March.

Under <u>Code of Virginia §51.1-144</u>, localities have the option to elect to phase in the amount the employee pays at a minimum of 1 percent each year until 2016, including a corresponding salary increase.

# Visit Hanover County and Scotchtown

#### Patrick Henry's Scotchtown

ca. 1719 16120 Chiswell Lane, Beaverdam, VA 23015

Scotchtown is best known as the home of Patrick Henry during the tumultuous years leading up to the American Revolution. It was at Scotchtown that he formulated the ideas of his famous "Liberty or Death" speech, and it was from the house that he rode to St. John's Church in Richmond on March 23, 1775 to deliver it.

Built around 1720 by Charles Chiswell, Scotchtown is architecturally unique. It features eight large rooms and a central passage below a large, undivided attic. The house is surrounded by reproduction outbuildings and gardens.

Scotchtown was acquired by Preservation Virginia in 1958. The house has been restored to its appearance during Patrick Henry's life and is open for tours seasonally. Visitors can explore the grounds, listen to a cell phone tour, enjoy the birding trail, shop in the museum store, or participate in one of the site's many hands-on classes and special events. Patrick Henry's Scotchtown is also available for private rental. Visit our weddings section for more information about site rentals for reunions, festivals and feasts, photo shoots, TV/Film shoots and of course, your special day!

Beginning in 2014, Patrick Henry's Scotchtown has updated our tour, furnishings plan and tour route. With more of a focus placed on Patrick Henry's life and legacy, visitors can expect to experience an dialogue based tour that discusses topics such as "Liberty," "Human Rights" and Revolution."
